Library patrons can have access to:

Company Salaries — Company specific salary, bonuses, and commission details help people negotiate and better understand salaries at a company and for specific jobs.




Interview Questions & Reviews — Helps people prepare for job interviews by providing actual interview questions and other details on specific employers from previous interview candidates.

Company Reviews — Helps people understand the pros and cons of working for a particular employer, as well as what the culture is like and what makes the employer unique.

Project Compass, WebJunction is helping public library staff around the country to better serve the needs of the struggling workforce.


Books for School Libraries. Many public libraries across the state work closely with their local school library. Here's an opportunity to share information with a fellow librarian, or to use this grant information as an entrée to make a new professional contact.

The Snapdragon Book Foundation, founded by a former librarian, offers grants that put books in kids' hands at public, private, and special schools. Grants range from \$500 to \$20,000 and are aimed at school libraries serving disadvantaged children.

Civil War Program Grant. The American Library Association (ALA) Public Programs Office and the National Endowment for the Humanities (NEH) are now accepting applications for **"Let's Talk About It: Making Sense of the American Civil War,"** a reading and discussion program in America's libraries. Public libraries are invited to apply online through **April 19** by visiting www.ala.org/civilwarprograms.



In June, 50 public libraries will be selected to host the reading and discussion series and receive support materials from the NEH and ALA. The program grant includes:

- ④ A \$2,500 grant to support program-related expenses
- ④ 25 sets of three titles: including *"March"* by Geraldine Brooks, *"Crossroads of Freedom: Antietam"* by James McPherson, and a forthcoming Civil War anthology of historical fiction, speeches, diaries, memoirs, biography and short stories.
- ④ Promotional materials, including posters, bookmarks, and folders to support local audience recruitment efforts.
- ④ Training for the library project director at a national workshop, where they will hear from the project scholar, expert librarians, and organizers, and receive a program planning guide, materials and ideas.

This intensive 3-day workshop will feature a curriculum to offer in-depth training that often is not found in library and information science degree programs. Expert instructors will cover intellectual property rights, digital imaging, metadata and cataloging, the application of social and new media in visual resources, the product environment, strategic planning,

Native American Library Services Basic Grants. The 2011 Native American Library Services Basic Grant guidelines are available. Federally recognized tribes and Alaska Native villages and corporations may apply for these grants in either the Basic or the Basic with Education/Assessment Option categories.



These noncompetitive grants are designed to support traditional core library services in tribal communities across the country. The supplemental Education/Assessment Option provides funds for continuing education opportunities for library staff and on-site library assessments. Please note that IMLS now publishes the Basic Grant guidelines separately from the competitive Enhancement Grant guidelines.

In 2010, IMLS supported 31 tribes with Native American Library Services Basic Grants and 190 tribes with Basic Grants with Education/Assessment Option, for a total of \$1.5 million. These grants funded myriad programs, from expanding library collections, to enhancing computers and Internet access, to providing important cultural programs as well as after-school activities for teenage youth.
